OUR NEW COMMUNITY CENTER

In 2022, we will open our landmark community center in Queens. This 24,000 sq. ft., 3-story building will double our space, and stand as a beacon of hope and power, enabling our impact to grow as we advocate for justice in New York and beyond.



THE FUND FOR EXCLUDED WORKERS

Through tenacious organizing, advocacy, and direct action culminating in a 23-day hunger strike, we won a first-in-the-nation \$2.1 billion Excluded Worker Fund in New York State. Our organizers and services teams helped thousands of people access the fund for desperately-needed relief.
