Victory! Law requiring landlords to remove toxic lead paint from apartments.


2010

Victory! NYS Wage Theft Prevention Act, the strongest policy of its type in the US.

2012

Victory! Won DACA through organizing and ensured that thousands of young New Yorkers secured this life-changing benefit.

2013

Victory! Community Safety Act, groundbreaking law aimed at ending discriminatory policing.


2014

Launched in New Jersey and Pennsylvania (2014), Connecticut (2015), and Nevada (2017). Expanded to Westchester (2018).

2017

Led airport protests that defeated the "Muslim ban" and prevented DACA from being dismantled.


2015

Victory! Healthcare access for trans and gender non-conforming New Yorkers.


2019

Victories! Forced corporations to divest from private prisons and won driver's licenses for all.

2018

Victory! Asthma-Free Housing Act requiring landlords to keep apartments free of pests and mold.

2020

Raised and distributed \$4.6M to 6K families impacted by Covid and ensured that thousands had access to healthcare and other services.


2021

Victories! Groundbreaking \$2.1B Excluded Workers Fund, investments in culturally responsive education, and more!


2022

Welcomed migrants arriving in NYC with cash assistance, pre-paid phones and services.
